

**LEEK.**—*Poireau*, Fr. *Porree*, Ger.

LARGE SCOTCH, large and tender .. #oz., \$0 25 | LARGE ROUEN, fine broad leaved .. #oz., \$0 25  
 Sow early in spring in beds or drills. When the plants are eight or ten inches high, transplant them in rows six inches apart, and twelve inches between the rows; plant the rows at least six inches deep, to have them well blanched. By many they are preferred to onions for soup, &c.

**LETTUCE.**—*Laitue*, Fr. *Lattich*, Ger.

WHEELER'S TOM THUMB—Very dwarf and compact, excellent flavor, crisp and refreshing, #pt. 25c  
 For early use, sow in hot-beds in February; and for general use, as early in the Spring as the ground can be worked, in a well-prepared bed or in drills; thin or transplant to one foot apart for heading. A sowing should be made at intervals throughout the season for succession. The Brown Dutch variety may be sown in September in a sheltered situation, and if protected by a loose covering of straw and evergreen boughs, will stand the Winter well, and prove very acceptable in early Spring.

**MUSK MELON.**—*Melon*, Fr. *Melone*, Ger.

**WATER MELON**—*Melon d'eau*, Fr. *Wassermelone*, Ger.

Musk varieties, plant middle of May, in hills five or six feet apart each way, well manured with old rotten compost; sow a dozen seeds to a hill, and after they are out of danger from bugs, thin to three or four plants; when they have four or five rough leaves, pinch off the ends of the main shoot, which will strengthen the growth of the vines, and they will come earlier to maturity. A light, rich, sandy soil and warm exposure is requisite to have fine-flavored fruit.

Water varieties, cultivate same as Musk, only that the hills should be eight feet apart each way.

**MUSHROOM**—*Champignon*, Fr. *Champignonbrut*, Ger.

Mushroom beds are best under cover; any cellar, shed or stable will answer, if protected from rain. During the months of September and October, collect from the stables daily the droppings, shake it well and lay it in a heap to ferment; turn and mix it well every six days, so that every part of it may be equally fermented and deprived of its bad odor. In three weeks the dung will be ready for the beds, which should be made four feet wide, and any length that may be necessary for a supply. In making the beds, lay on the prepared dung from eighteen to twenty-four inches; in this state it may remain until the temperature is sufficiently mild, which may be ascertained by thrusting small
