Our Turnip Seeds are carefull grown by experience growers in England and Scotland, from selected roots of the finest stocks.

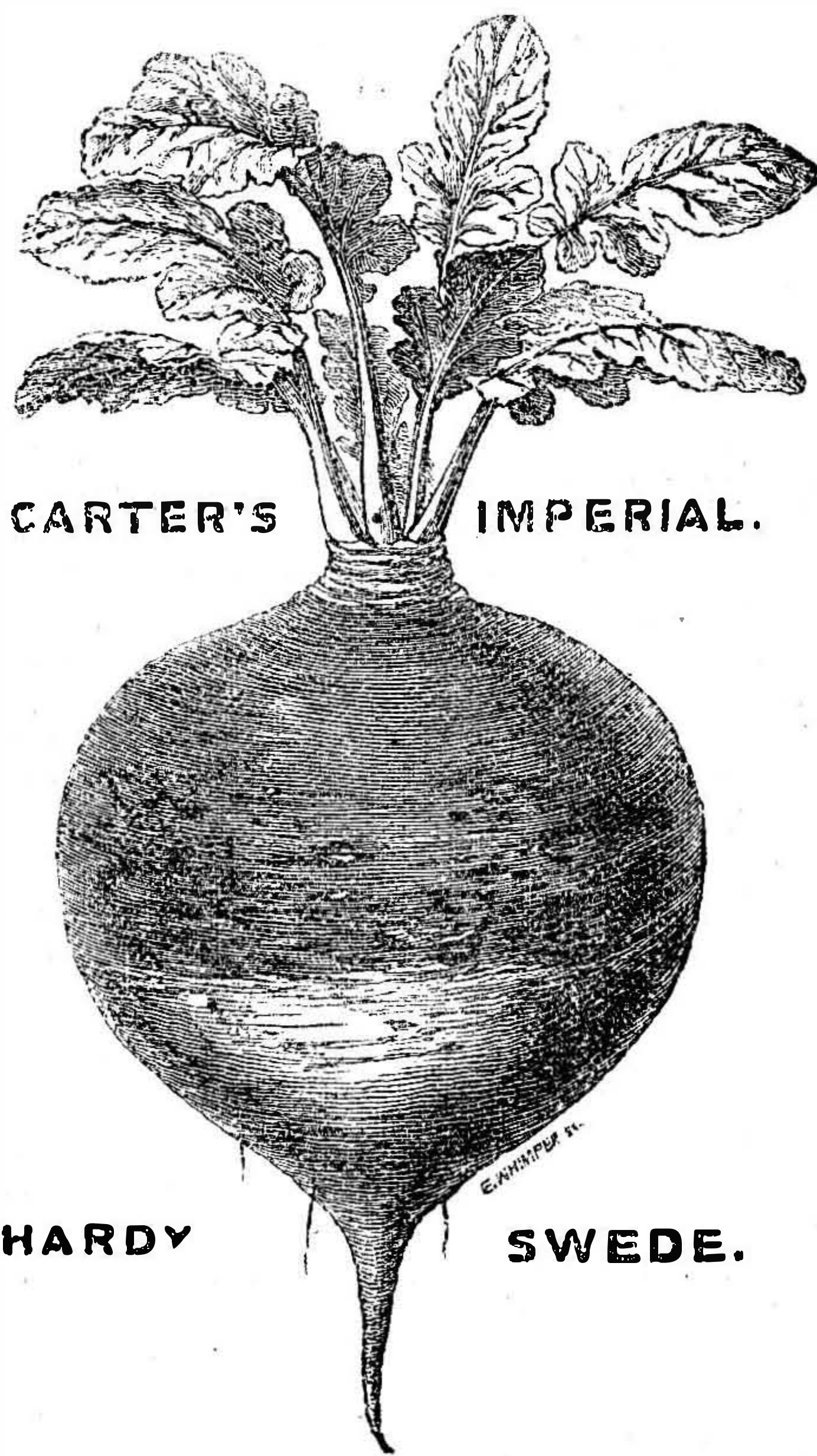
The Turnip crop is now one of the most important grown on the farm ; and its success no doubt, depends greatly on the preparation of the soil, and judicious application of manures, but *not less so on the quality of the Seed*, and the care exercised in the selection of the *bulbs* from which the seed is saved.

Impressed with this fact, we have for many years paid special attention to the growth of Turnip Seed, and the increased demand we experience each successive season, as well as the gratifying accounts we receive from all parts of the Province as to the excellence of our Turnip Seed, affords us satisfactory evidence of the superiority of our stocks, and the success that has attended our efforts.

SWEDISH TURNIPS.—Section 1.

The period for sowing Swedish Turnips is usually governed by the description of soil, it is necessary to sow early on a strong heavy soil, than when it is light sharp or gravelly. From the last week in May to the middle of July, is not considered unseasonable, having respect to the previous observation. Three lbs of seed is sufficient to sow an acre when cultivated in drills 18 inches to two feet apart, and 1b per acre when sown broadcast.
